

One of the most enjoyable parts of working in the garden is being able to work alongside our feathered friends. Some of the avifauna we see regularly are very shy and will not come within camera range; for example the Eastern Rosellas that raid the seed pods of the Liquidambar that hangs over our fence line. However, the tree and its seedpods, loose bark and high perches that attracts most of the birds to our garden is our large Magnolia soulangeana beside the driveway.

There are other important reasons for having birds in your garden. Firstly, like bats, bees and wasps; birds like Noisy Miners and Rainbow Lorikeets which are pollen and nectar gatherers both act as pollination vectors for camellias which can have very large quantities of both for bird food. In our garden we have a beautiful, white cross of Hagoromo and Margaret Waterhouse which is the result of just such natural breeding. Secondly, many of the birds that we have visiting regularly are hunters of all things creepy-crawly. Noisy Miners especially are avid searchers among leaves and branches especially when there is less pollen and nectar to be found.

Main 3 Garden Elements



Hard Landscaping

The ideal space/density ratio of a garden design is ideally 1:3 for a leafier garden or 3:1 if more open areas are preferred

Main 3 Garden elements:

- Hard Landscaping paths and steps, patios, walls, water features...
- Lawns Select a type to suit your garden aspects
- Plants Trees, shrubs, groundcovers in garden beds

Hard Landscaping - steps, paths, patios, ponds, pergolas - paving clean & moss protected

- Old paving can be sealed to prevent build up of moss particularly in shaded areas.
- Solution: high pressure clean then apply a waterproof sealer e.g. Amberseal or Drytreat





Lawns - Highest maintenance keep it healthy & vigorous, shape edging simple and flowing







- selection - 'Sir Walter' buffalo, couch. Kikuyu

Lawns

- Buffalo Sir Walter Buffalo has been bred specifically to provide a low maintenance, shade tolerant grass for Sydney gardens
- Couch not shade tolerant
- Kikuyu very invasive, often sparse, spreads by seed

A Healthy Lawn Requires......

- A healthy lawn chokes out weeds & is easier to maintain
- 300mm of deep, well drained, fertile soil for root growth
- pH 7 to deter weed invasion apply Dolomite Lime every 2 years
- For ease of mowing, eliminate garden beds and corners and keep the lawn shape simple and flowing
- To re-establish a sparse lawn:
 - Aerate fork to depth of tines
 - Treat with dolomite lime
 - Top dress with a mix of sand and cow manure
- Fertilize every spring with a 9 month Slow Release Fertilizer that contains trace elements e.g. Osmocote, Nutricote

Making Mowing Easier

- Set Mower height high, keep blades sharp and supply your own mower if hiring a mowing service
- Regular high mowing green leaves should remain after mowing don't shave your lawn

That's why lawns are high maintenance!

Plants - trees and shrubs



Soil Fertility

- Aerate the soil by **forking** to 12 inches depth
- Spread clay soil generously with gypsum and leave for 2 weeks
- Spread a generous layer of milled cow manure over the soil but not against plant stems & fork in
- Mulch after planting with 4-6 inches of e.g. Who Flung Dung, eucalyptus mulch or leaf litter
- Don't use bark or woodchip as they draw nitrogen from the soil as they decompose













Weed Control







Weeds are opportunists, hardy adaptable invasive plants that seed prolifically, often within 3 weeks of germinating Most weeds, including grasses, are annuals and grow from seed

Perennial weeds e.g. oxalis, onion weed, wandering Jew require hand removal and/Or repetitive Glyphosate treatment

More about Weeds . . .

Solutions

- Hand weeding easier when soil is moist
- Mulch, Mulch, Mulch to smother annual weeds as they germinate
- Spot spray with Glyphosate (Zero)
- Lawn weeds are suppressed by healthy lawn growth but if persistent, use a selective spray recommended for the lawn type

Pruning

Hide pruning equipment from those who would keep your plants 'Under Control'!









- · Light, frequent pruning encourages healthy leaf growth and stimulates flowering
- Prune early spring or after flowering
- Use clean, sharp secateurs and garden saws
- Clean with alcohol (methylated spirits) between plants to avoid spread of disease


